- i. Recent poll data (Marquette Poll): [Marquette law poll](#)
 - 81% support background checks (16% opposed). Back in 2016 86% supported background checks (12% opposed)
 - Of those with a gun in their household- 78% support background checks (18% oppose). Without a gun, 86% support (13% oppose)
 - 55% favor a ban on assault-style weapons (40% oppose).
 - Of those with a gun in their household- 43% favor a ban on assault-style weapons (52% oppose)
 - WI voters differ on effectiveness of possible new gun control laws
- ii. Are there areas of safety that SWSA can provide leadership? Consider:
 - Opposition of legislation that requires /allows teachers to carry or use guns in schools
 - Supporting universal background checks (see polling data)
 - Supporting risk factor assessments in disqualifying gun purchase/ownership (temporarily)

The Collective Impact Framework is the **commitment** of a group of important actors from **different sectors** to a **common agenda** for solving a specific social problem. (SSIR, 2011- Kania & Kramer)

The team from the Racine School District and Higher Expectations will share their journey in bringing a cross sector group of committed stakeholders together and the results they are achieving. They will also provide some basic education on the Collective Impact Framework.

“In 2008, the Racine County Workforce Development Board embraced the creation of a workforce development strategy with the vision of a workforce that will be fully employed by the year 2020. Educational, private, public, non-profit, and faith-based organizations met to address the root causes of chronic underemployment in the county, particularly for the inner city of Racine.

After spending several years creating the foundation for collaborative work, 2014 was the official start-up year for the Higher Expectations collective impact initiative. This initiative builds on the original Higher Expectations workforce development plan and is developing a powerful, multi-year career to cradle partnership in Racine County.”

Higher Expectations of Racine County, Wisconsin is a member of the national [StriveTogether Cradle to Career Network](#) that launched in 2011 as a way to connect communities who are building cradle to career civic infrastructure using the StriveTogether framework. The Network enables members to identify and adapt programs that work, share expertise, and develop effective tools and resources that can be brought to bear on specific challenges.

Higher Expectations was recently recognized as 1 of 5 communities across the nation to be recognized by StriveTogether for meeting education and employment goals.
